



**MARTIN HELRICH, M.D.**  
**(1922-2013)**

The late Martin Helrich, M.D. graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Dickinson College and the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine and completed an internship at Atlantic City Hospital. Dr. Helrich began his career in Anesthesiology at New York University-Bellevue Medical Center. Under the tutelage of pioneers E.A. Rovenstine and E.M. Papper, Dr. Helrich built a firm foundation for clinical care, research and teaching. Following discharge from the Army, Dr. Helrich returned to the University of Pennsylvania Anesthesiology Research Laboratories having been awarded a National Heart Institute fellowship. As a consultant and Assistant Professor, he established himself as a first-class experimental physiologist.

In 1956, Dr. Helrich moved to Baltimore, appointed as a Professor and the third Chairman of Anesthesiology in the University of Maryland School of Medicine. For 31 years, Dr. Helrich displayed those professional and personal qualities that he imbued in all those he touched - integrity, patience and wisdom. He emphasized the importance of delivering clinical care while teaching residents and students and engaging in state-of-the-art experimental investigation.

Dr. Helrich's work as the first Executive Director of the Foundation for Anesthesia Education and Research has been instrumental in its success. In addition he served as a Director, Secretary and President of the American Board of Anesthesiology, a Director of the American Society of Anesthesiologists, a Governor of the American College of Anesthesiologists and as President of the Maryland-D.C. Society of Anesthesiologists. In 1995, Dr. Helrich was the recipient of the American Society of Anesthesiologists Distinguished Service Award.



**M. JANE MATJASKO, M.D.**  
**(1942-2011)**

The late M. Jane Matjasko, M.D, an honored graduate of Mercyhurst College and the Medical College of Pennsylvania, arrived at the University of Maryland Hospital in July of 1968. Four years later, Dr. Matjasko joined the faculty in the School of Medicine after serving an internship, residency and fellowship in the Department of Anesthesiology. For the next thirty-three years, Dr. Matjasko served the Department in many capacities: founding a Section of Neuroanesthesiology; as Vice-Chair; and, beginning in 1986, as interim Chair. In January, 1990, M. Jane Matjasko MD was appointed the fourth Chair of Anesthesiology in the University of Maryland School of Medicine.

During her near two-decade stewardship, the Department grew both in the scope and complexity of its mission. The Department expanded to include approximately 100 faculty and residents, serving four different hospitals affiliated with the University of Maryland and providing expert care in all of the subspecialties of anesthesiology.

Though Dr. Matjasko served on many prestigious Committees of the American Society of Anesthesiology, the Accreditation Committee for Graduate Medical Education and as a Director of the American Board of Anesthesiology, perhaps she is most recognized by those at Maryland for her dedication to resident education. Dr. Matjasko provided both the time and resources needed to train almost 300 residents and fellows; her name will long be synonymous with the practice of anesthesiology at the University of Maryland.

**CHAD M. BRUMMETT, M.D.**

Chad M. Brummett, M.D., is a Professor and Anesthesiologist at the University of Michigan where he serves as the Senior Associate Chair for Research. He is internationally recognized for his work on opioids and the predictors of acute and chronic post-surgical pain.

Dr. Brummett has authored >250 publications, with key articles appearing in the *Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA)*, *JAMA Surgery*, *Anesthesiology*, and *Annals of Surgery*. He is the Co-Director of the Opioid Prescribing Engagement Network (OPEN) at the University of Michigan, which aims to apply a preventative approach to the opioid epidemic in the US through appropriate prescribing after surgery, dentistry, and emergency medicine. He also serves as the Director of Pain Research and the Director of Clinical Anesthesia Research in the Department of Anesthesiology at the medical school.

Nationally, Dr. Brummett serves as a Program Director of the Medical Student Anesthesia Research Fellowship and Research, as well as Chair of the Pipeline Committee for the Foundation for Anesthesia Education and Research (FAER). Additionally, Dr. Brummett serves as an Executive Editor for *Regional Anesthesia and Pain Medicine (RAPM)*, Associate Editor for *Anesthesiology*, and as an ad hoc reviewer for numerous reputable journals including the *British Medical Journal*, *New England Journal of Medicine*, and *JAMA*.

Dr. Brummett received his M.D. at Indiana University School of Medicine and completed his residency and chief residency at the University of Michigan Medical School where he was awarded the Peter J. Cohen Resident Research Award in the Department of Anesthesiology. Following residency, Dr. Brummett completed his fellowship at Johns Hopkins University. His research interests include predictors of acute and chronic post-surgical pain and failure to derive benefit from interventions and surgeries primarily performed to treat pain. In particular, he is interested in the impact of a fibromyalgia-like or centralized pain phenotype on analgesic outcomes. He is the Co-PI of multiple NIH grants studying these concepts, and also receives funding from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, SAMHSA, CDC, and multiple foundations.
