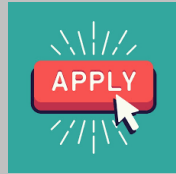

- ☐ **Submit** your Residency Application!
Finish **application** and upload **supporting documents**
- ☐ Follow up with **Letter** Writers (recommend they submit by September 1)
- ☐ Review your **MSPE** for accuracy, spelling, grammar
- ☐ Choose/refine **program list** (Resources – specialty advisors, near-peers, residency explorer/EMRA Match/Alignment Index, OSA advisor)

Application Basics

When is the best time to complete your application? Students may begin submitting applications as early as September 2nd. We recommend students submit on or before September 17th (Residency CAS) or September 23rd (ERAS). Do NOT wait until the last minute as systems often crash during times of high activity. Note there is no specific benefit to submitting early, as programs cannot see your applications until the release regardless of when you submit. Note: In ERAS, once you CERTIFY your application, you cannot go back in and edit.

Important Tips

- Don't wait to get started on this!
- OSA is available to answer questions regarding application completion
- Use the resources available to you based on your application system

 - The ResidencyCAS [EM Worksheet](#) and [OBGYN Worksheet](#)
- Submit request and payment your USMLE transcripts through Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB)'s [USMLE portal](#). [ERAS users must also initiate retrieval of USMLE transcripts under additional documents]
- Manage your documents – some documents are assigned to programs by default and others require you to make assignments to programs manually
- We recommend someone reviews your Personal Statement, and Impactful Experiences section if you choose to complete it.
- Finalize your program lists – including total number of programs and which programs to apply –discussions with OSA Deans/Departmental advisors may be helpful in understanding your competitiveness for particular programs.

Program Signaling

We strongly encourage that you use ALL signals available to you.

- Strategies regarding signaling are unique to specialty/applicant.
- In general, your signals should include a mix of target and reach programs; with the majority being programs where you are competitive.

Need additional advice about signaling? OSA is here to help! Specialty Advisors are another great resource.

Should I signal my home or away programs? National recommendations say YES to both (except for EM). We recommend following that advice unless told otherwise by your specialty-specific advisors at home and away.

Please share consider sharing your signal list with us/your school! This is helpful in advising future year students!

Geographic Preferences

Generally, the best strategy is when your Geographic Preferences align with your program list and signaled programs. If you are applying to a broad geographic area (i.e. > 3 regions), we recommend selecting “No Geographic Preference”. This strategy may be unique to individuals/specialty; discuss with your OSA Dean if you are uncertain.

Note, the following specialties are not participating in geographic preference signaling for the 2027 application cycle: Emergency Medicine (and EM/Combined), Obstetrics & Gynecology, Orthopedic Surgery, Otolaryngology, and Plastic Surgery.

Application Components

Transcripts

- OSA will upload your Transcripts – you do NOT need to request
- You should see the Transcripts uploaded early to mid- September
 - Transcripts have already been upload to SF Match
- Students may review their transcripts at anytime on SURFS

The MSPE

- We are preparing your MSPE.
- A draft copy of your MSPE is now available for your review (due 9/7)
- The MSPE will be uploaded to your application system prior to September 23rd
- NOTE that regardless of specialty/application timeline, the MSPE is available to all programs nationally at the same time on September 23rd
- Note that Dr. Thom reviews and signs all MSPEs, your ‘MSPE writer’ is the OSA Dean you worked with throughout the season.

Personal Statement

- Feeling Stuck? Check Out: RAM [Personal Statement Guidelines](#)
- Have someone read your PS (We are happy to review these!)
- Keep it to ~ 1 page

Letters of Recommendation

- Aim to have these uploaded by the 1st week of September when possible.
- If you aim to get a letter from a September rotation, plan ahead to discuss the request with faculty to ensure these are received on time
- If you are having difficulty securing a letter, reach out to OSA ASAP
- Make sure you understand the requirements of your specific programs (e.g., most require 3 letters, but some may require a 4th; some require a “chair” letter, etc...). You may need to review your program webpages for detailed requirements.
- Note that once letters are assigned to a program this cannot be changed.

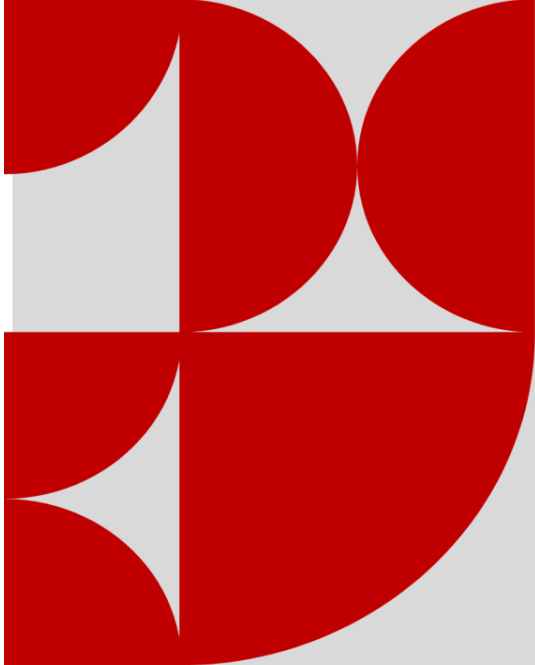

NRMP

What is the NRMP and what do I do now?

The NRMP is the [National Resident Match Program](#), the organization that runs The Match. This is separate from ERAS/ResidencyCAS (which manage your applications) and requires a separate registration.

Registration opens September 15th and is due by January 29th, 2027 after which time an additional \$50 late fee is applied

What's Ahead
